

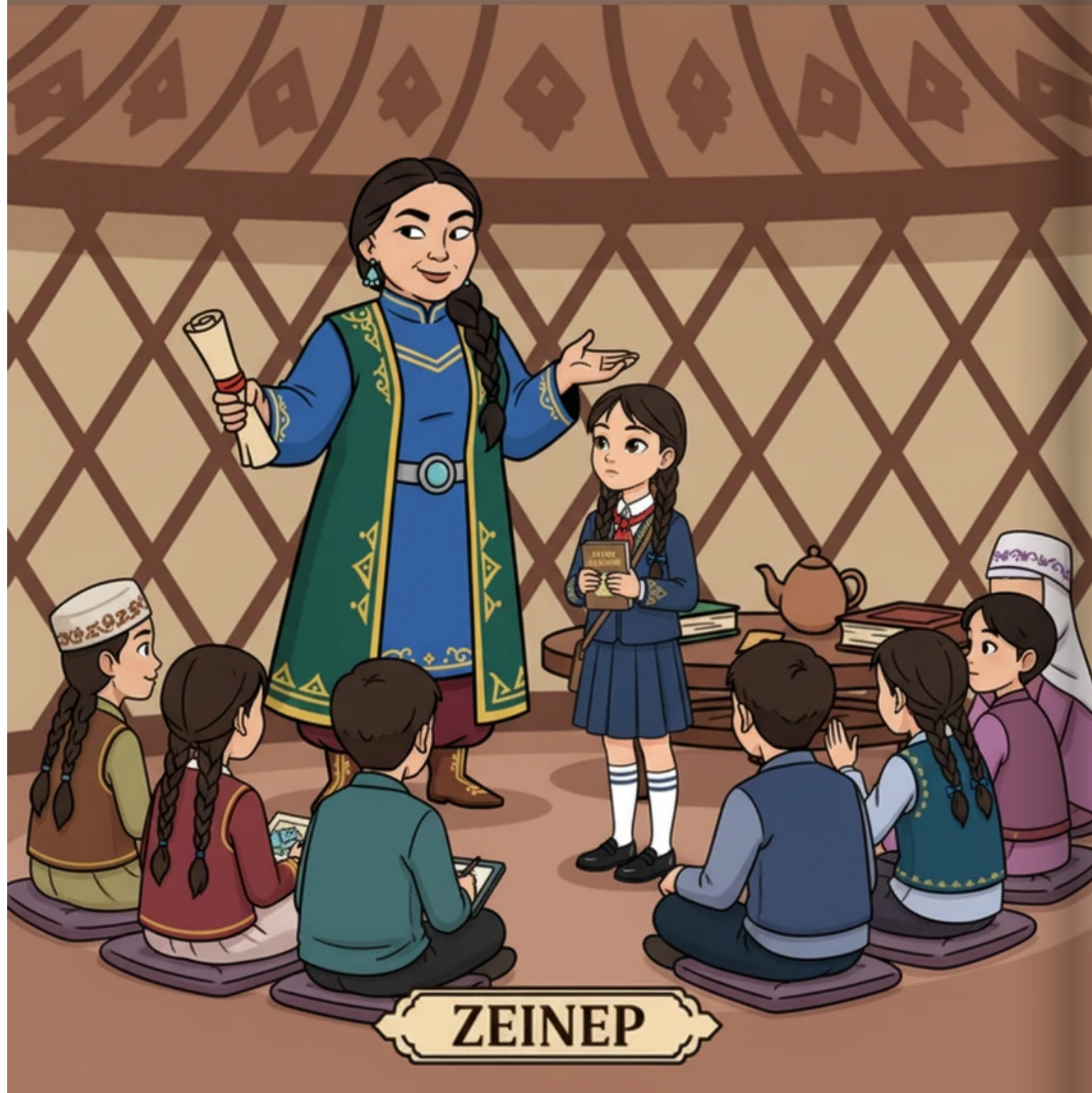


The Key to Life: Zeinep's Lesson on Functional Literacy

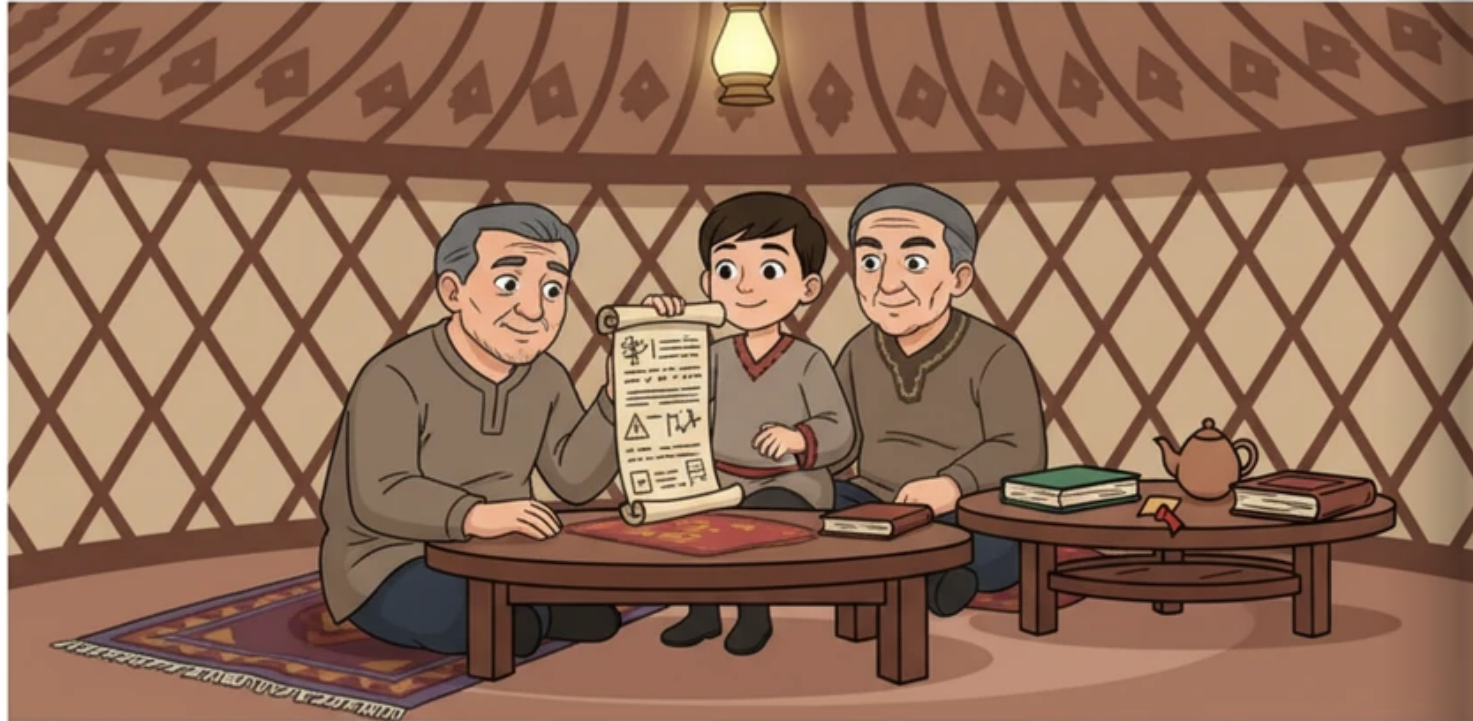
