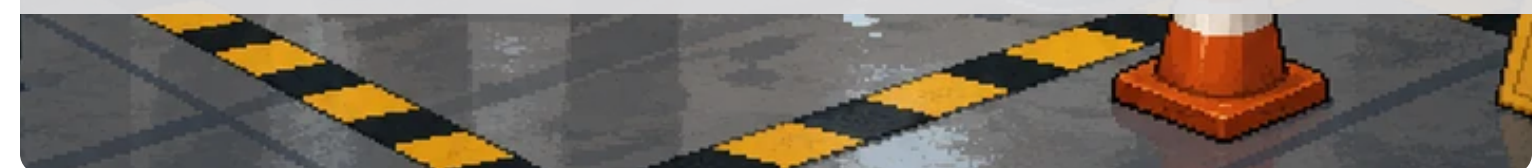




Guardian of the Workplace: A Professional Guide to Occupational Safety and Health

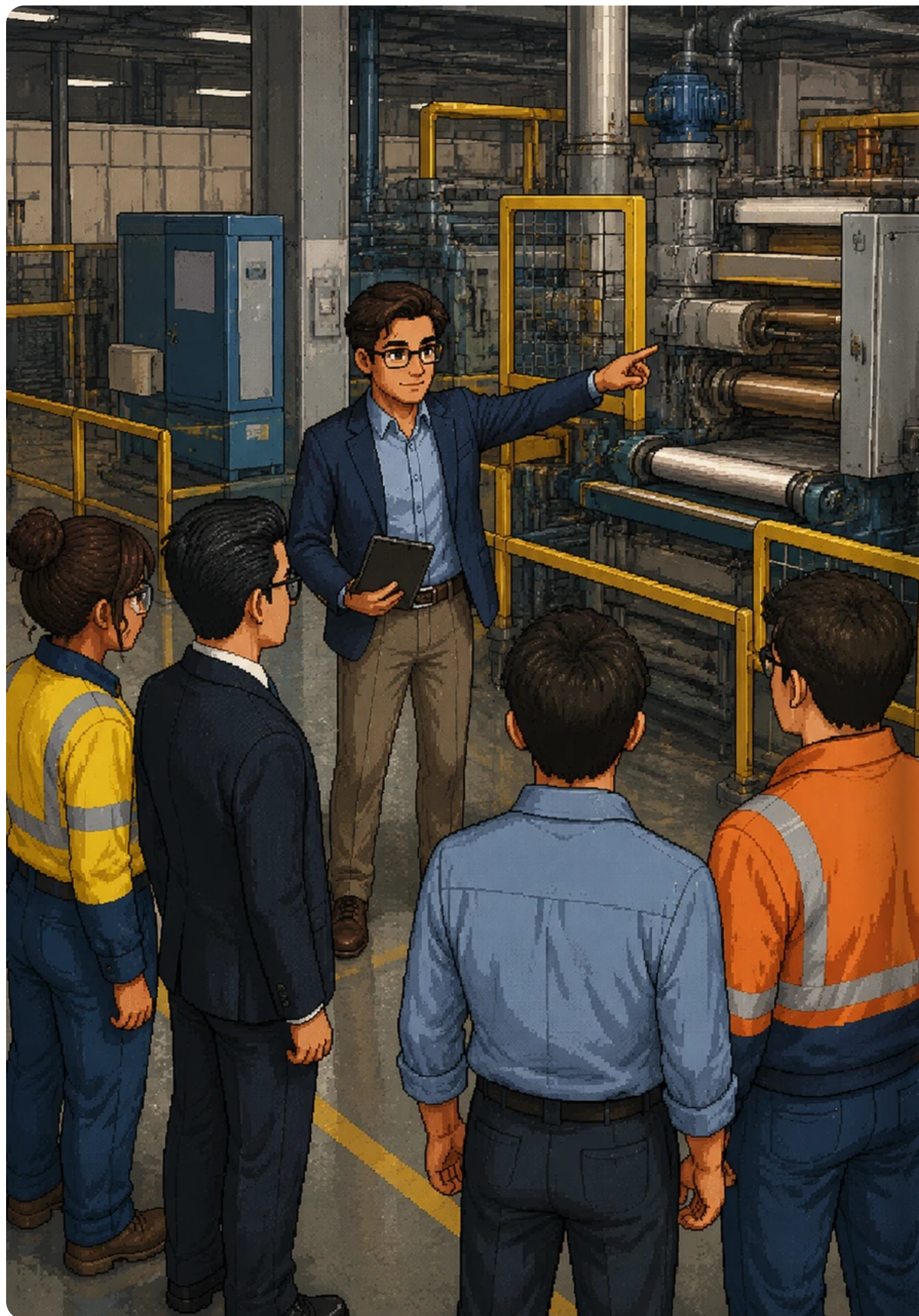

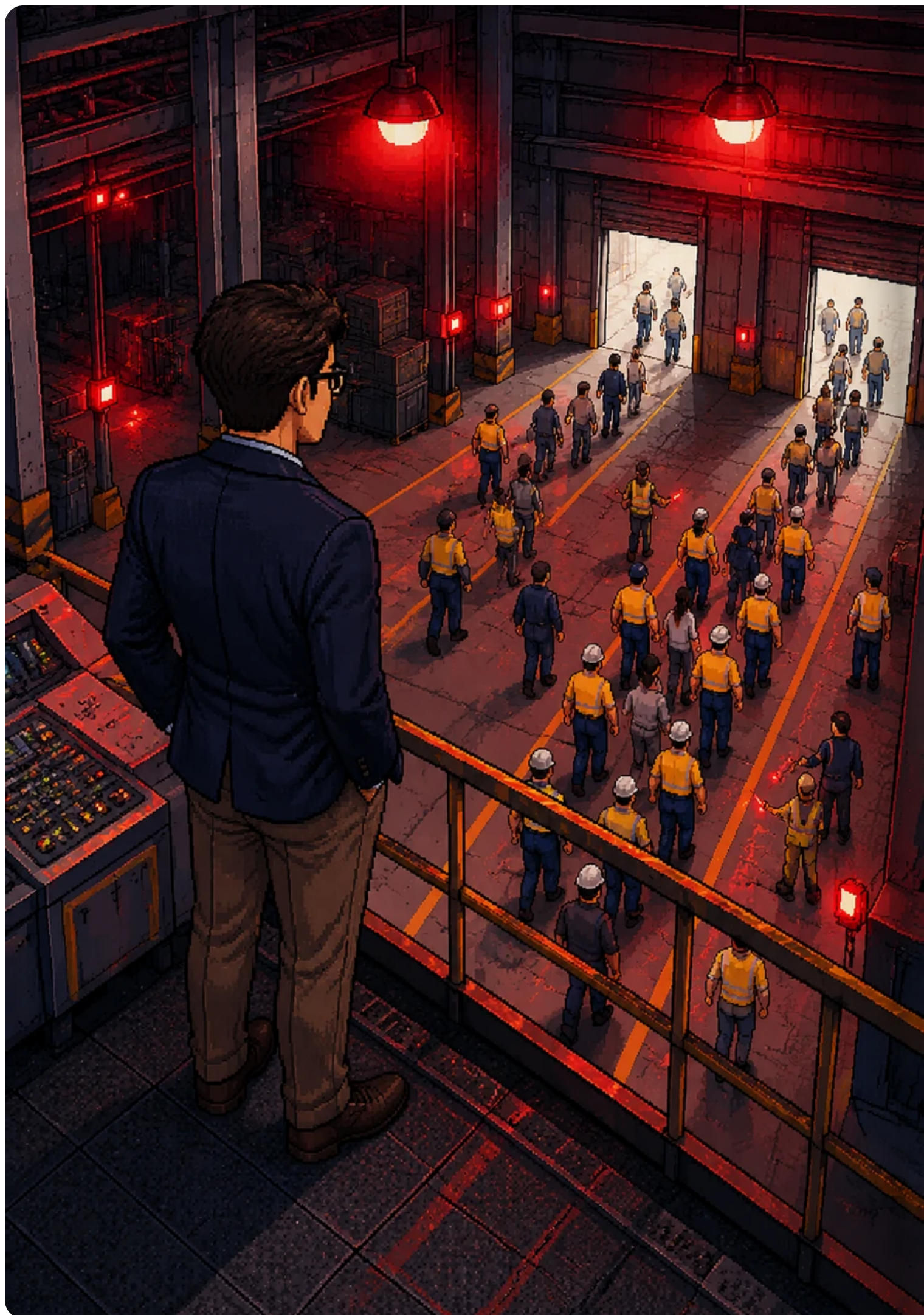

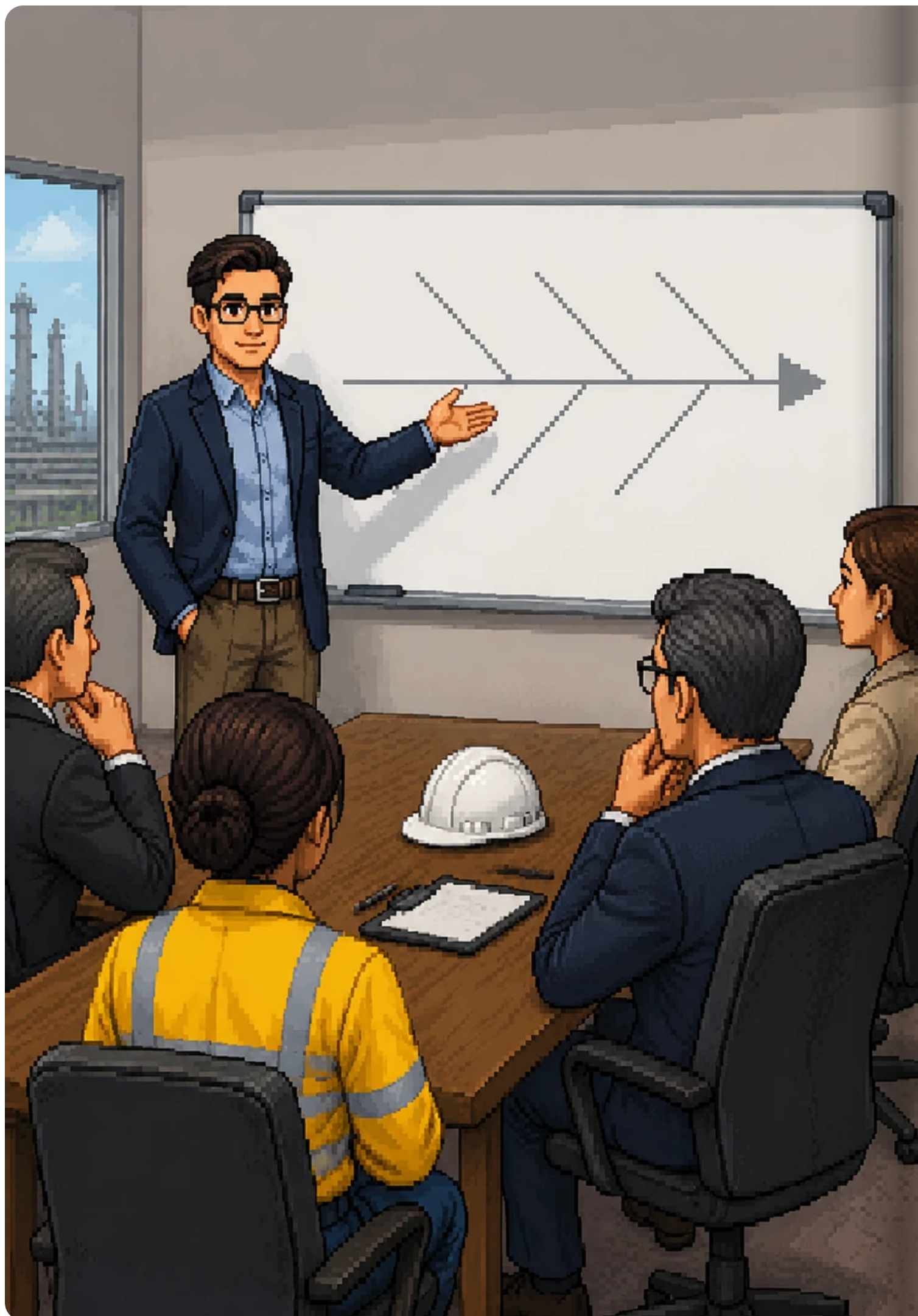
