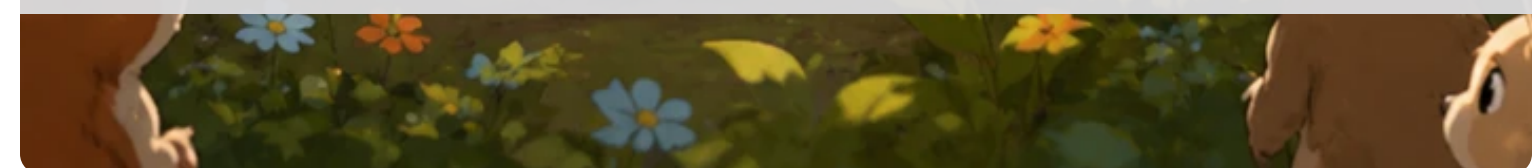




The Forest Law is Common to All
