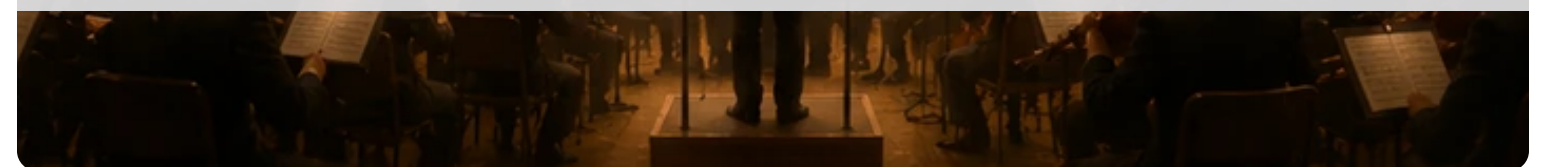




# Gaziza Zhubanova: Star of the Great Steppe

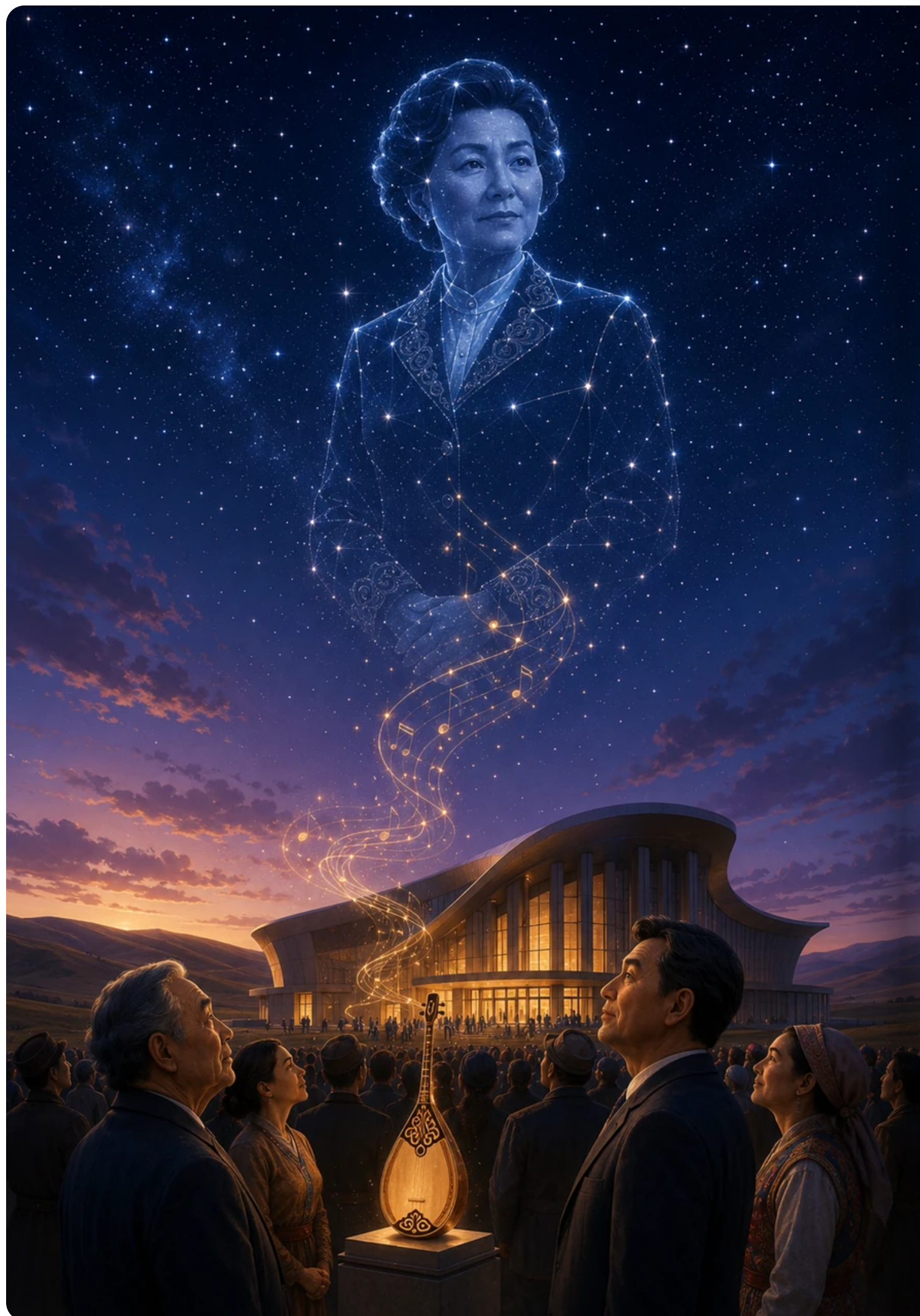
